# ABOUT DEPARTMENT

The Department of Management Studies, commenced its operation in 2012 with 28 students in its inaugural BBA batch, has now grown to accommodate 54 students within 12 year span. Two faculties handled the subjects and the department was managed by the Dept. of Commerce. In 2014, the Department of Management Studies became an independent department.

**BBA** is three-year professional undergraduate Business course in Management. It is open to students from all three streams: Science, Arts and Commerce. The BBA course offers knowledge and training in management and leadership skills to prepare them for managerial roles and entrepreneurship.



The department of Management Studies has been shifted from the middle block to the eastern block in November 2022.

Our esteemed institution stands as a beacon of educational excellence in the Trivandrum district, having pioneered the introduction of the Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) program. Being one of the oldest colleges in the region to offer this program, our institution has played a pivotal role in shaping the academic landscape. Over the years, the educational landscape in Trivandrum has evolved, witnessing the establishment of 33 self-financing colleges and an additional 15 University Institutes of Technology (UITs) that now also provide the BBA course. In total, there are currently 48 colleges offering BBA in the district.

Despite the burgeoning competition, our college remains unparalleled in its standing, characterized by its exceptional performance and diverse range of activities. The consistent commitment to academic excellence, coupled with a rich array of extracurricular and co-curricular initiatives, has solidified our institution's reputation. Our college's steadfast dedication to providing quality education and fostering holistic development has set it apart as a benchmark for other institutions in the region.

The pioneering role we have played in introducing BBA in this district reflects our commitment to staying at the forefront of academic innovation. # RESULT PROGRESSION

Over the past years, the academic performance of students has exhibited a notable trend of improvement, as reflected in the consistently rising percentages from 2012 to 2017. In 2012, the student body achieved an impressive 88%, showcasing a strong foundation for academic excellence. Although there was a slight dip in 2013, with a percentage of 70.96%, subsequent years witnessed a commendable recovery. In 2014, the percentage surged to 86.48%, maintaining an upward trajectory with 87.87% in 2015. However, a marginal decline occurred in 2016, with a percentage of 82.85%, yet the resilience of the students was evident as they rebounded with 87.87% in 2017. Unfortunately, the trend took a downturn in 2018 and 2019, with percentages of 79.41% and 78.94% respectively. The year 2020 presented an unprecedented challenge, with the percentage plummeting to 47%, potentially indicating external factors affecting academic performance.

Highlighting the individual achievements and recognizing the dedication of the students, the following are the rank holders across different years. In 2012, Nandhini secured the top position, attaining the 9th rank, setting a benchmark for excellence. The year 2013 saw outstanding performances, with Hena Sakeer claiming the coveted 1st position, accompanied by Ramya M S securing the 4th position. Archana, in 2014, clinched the 7th rank, showcasing her academic prowess. Fathima Jishana earned the 9th rank in 2015, adding to the consistent display of excellence. Sangamitra secured the 6th position in 2016, contributing to the tradition of stellar achievements. In 2017, Sruthy demonstrated exceptional performance, securing the 9th position. Kavya, in 2018, achieved the 10th rank, followed by Soumya in 2019, also securing the 10th position. Despite the challenges of 2020, Arjun's determination shone through as he secured the 10th position.

This impressive roster of rank holders not only reflects the academic prowess of the students but also highlights the dedication, resilience, and consistent efforts put forth by the entire student body over the years.

# PAPER WISE ANALYSIS

Currently, we have a total enrollment of 131 students, spanning all three academic years. Despite most students coming from diverse backgrounds such as humanities and science, the major subjects in BBA are commerce-oriented. Among the 47 colleges providing BBA courses in Kerala University, National College has consistently demonstrated outstanding performance, earning different ranks each year. In the most recent examination results, our department has demonstrated commendable academic performance, achieving a favorable percentage in comparison to the overall university average. Specifically, 21 out of 39 students successfully cleared all papers, reflecting our commitment to academic excellence. Arjun S secured the prestigious tenth rank in the university results, further highlighting the quality of education provided by the Department of Management Studies.

# Result Analysis of Semester 1 (S1), 2022-25:

The examination results for Semester 1 reveal a comprehensive overview of the academic performance of our students. Out of a total of 48 students, 13 students successfully cleared the

papers, resulting in a percentage of 27%, which surpasses the university average of 25%. Additionally, it is noteworthy that Dhanushia of S3 secured the 6th rank in the overall standings. For a more detailed understanding, individual subject analyses are attached to this report.

#### **Reasons for Poor Performance:**

Several factors contributed to the challenges faced by students during the Semester 1 examinations:

those from different streams and with weaker mathematical foundations. The paper featured

tougher problems this year, impacting students without a commerce background.

- 1. Revised Syllabus: The introduction of a new syllabus this year presented a challenge, as question patterns and previous question banks were unavailable, impacting students' preparation.
- 2. Diverse Backgrounds: A significant portion of the student body comes from science and humanities backgrounds, making it challenging for them to adjust to commerce-oriented subjects.
- 3. Late Admissions: Delayed admissions affected the students' ability to adequately follow subjects, resulting in a lack of proper preparation for examinations.

# **Subjectwise Analysis:**

1. Statistics:

- Cleared: 16 students

- Backlog: 32 students

The nature of Statistics, being a problem paper, poses challenges for students, particularly




prioritized theory portions were emphasized, adversely affecting results.

# 2. Accounting:

- Cleared: 26 students

- Backlog: 22 students

Accounting, known for its complexity, saw areas marked as less priority being examined extensively, affecting overall performance. Tricky questions requiring deeper thinking also impacted student outcomes.



Managerial Economics

- Cleared: 30 students

- Backlog: 18 students

This theory-intensive paper posed challenges for students from different streams due to a lack of foundational knowledge. Exam included more indirect or nuanced questions, students have found it challenging to provide comprehensive and accurate answers, contributing to a higher number of backlogs.

4. Management

- Cleared: 36 students

- Backlog: 12 students

Management as a subject often involves intricate concepts and theories. Students may have

faced challenges in understanding and applying these complex ideas, leading to a backlog.

There were significant changes in the examination pattern and style of questions, students

have found it challenging to adapt, impacting their results.

5. EVS

- Cleared: 42 students

- Backlog: 6 students

The individuals who did not succeed are facing challenges in their academic performance, as

they are identified as students who generally struggle in their studies. This difficulty in

academics is considered the primary factor contributing to their lack of success in the exam.

6. English

- Cleared: 47 students

- Backlog: 1 students

Result Analysis of Semester 3 (S3), 2021-24:

The examination results for Semester 1 reveal a comprehensive overview of the academic

performance of our students. Out of 46 students, where 28 students successfully passed all

subjects, resulting in a pass rate of approximately 60%. This surpasses the university

percentage

of 49%, underscoring the commendable academic performance of the students in comparison to the broader university cohort.


Within this successful group, two students particularly distinguished themselves, securing top positions in the university rankings. Tincy, with an impressive GPA of 8.86, achieved the remarkable feat of securing the 1st rank. Similarly, Shahina, with a high GPA of 8.72, secured the 2nd rank in the university.

# **Subjectwise Analysis:**

# 1. Cost and management accounting:

- Cleared: 32 students

- Backlog: 14 students



Cost and Management Accounting is perceived as a challenging subject, which involves intricate concepts related to cost analysis, budgeting, and decision-making. The complexity of these concepts challenged students. Questions were described as both tough and tricky which also affected result.

2. Business Environment Policy:

- Cleared: 35 students

- Backlog: 11 students

There were indirect questions which challenged students to attempt the questions. There were

questions which required students to think deeper which made the students in pressure while

answering questions and resulted in poor results.

3. Corporate regulations

- Cleared: 38 students

- Backlog: 8 students

The subject primarily involves theoretical concepts, and those students who encountered

difficulty in grasping and studying the theoretical aspects of the subject were the ones who

faced challenges and ultimately failed the exam.

4. Financial services

- Cleared: 39 students

- Backlog: 7 students

The reason behind the lack of success of few students are attributed to difficulties in their

academic performance, specifically their challenges in understanding and studying the

material, leading to unsuccessful outcomes in the financial services exam.

5. Consumer Behaviour

- Cleared: 41 students

- Backlog: 5 students

The notable factor contributing to their lack of success revolves around their academic

performance. Specifically, these students faced difficulties in comprehending and applying the concepts related to consumer behaviour, ultimately resulting in their failure to successfully navigate the exam.



## **Remedies Taken:**

In response to the identified challenges, the department has implemented a range of strategic remedies to enhance performance in future examinations:

These initiatives aim to equip students with the tools necessary to overcome obstacles and perform better in upcoming examinations.

It is noteworthy that, traditionally, the initial two semesters often present challenges for students as they acclimate to the new academic system. This trend, apparent in the results of preceding cohorts, underscores the transitional period students undergo during the early stages of their academic journey. Despite these initial challenges, the department remains dedicated to providing the necessary support structures and educational resources to facilitate students' adjustment and subsequent success.

# Result Analysis of Semster 4 (S4), 2021-24:

The analysis of the Semester 4 (S4) results reveals a notably robust performance by our student cohort. Out of the 46 students who appeared for the examinations, an impressive 38 students successfully passed all their papers. This outstanding achievement translates to a remarkable pass rate of 82.61%, a stark contrast to the university's overall pass rate of 58.02%. This substantial difference underscores the exceptional dedication and academic prowess exhibited by our students, showcasing a commitment to excellence that surpasses the broader university standards.

One particularly noteworthy highlight of the results is the outstanding performance of Atma, who not only passed all papers but also secured a notable Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of 8.26. This remarkable achievement earned Atma the 6th rank in the university rankings.

## The subjectwise analysis:

#### 1. Entrepreneurship Development:

• Pass Rate: 38 students passed, reflecting a commendable success rate.

• Failures: 8 students faced challenges in this subject.

The evaluation of the paper was very tight which affected the pass percentage of the paper.


## 2. Business Ethics and Corporate Governance:

- Pass Rate: 39 students successfully passed, indicating a strong grasp of ethical principles.
- Failures: 7 students encountered difficulties in this course.

Overall the paper relays on the theoretical aspects for which certain students face difficulty. This has adversely affected the result.

# 3. Operations Management:

- Pass Rate: 38 students demonstrated proficiency in operations management.
- Failures: 8 students faced challenges.



This paper is comparatively a tough paper and this paper is found to be a little bit challenging for the students.

# 4. Skill Development and Employability Orientation

- Pass Rate: A significant 44 students passed, highlighting the effectiveness of the course.
- Failures: Only 2 students faced challenges.

# 5. Advertising and Sales Promotion

- Pass Rate: 41 students successfully navigated advertising and sales promotion concepts.
- Failures: 5 students faced difficulties.



# BEd AND INTEGRATED BBA POSSIBILITIES

The prospect of incorporating the BBA program within the purview of the Commerce Department under the Centre of Management Studies represents a strategic initiative that can significantly contribute to the department's growth. While the traditional BEd program may not be feasible for the BBA course, the option of an integrated BBA course offers a promising avenue for departmental expansion. The proposed incorporation aligns seamlessly with the existing academic structure and ethos of the Commerce Department, providing a cohesive framework for students to explore interdisciplinary facets.

An alternative avenue worth exploring is the introduction of the Dual Degree Course in Management, specifically the Bachelor of Management (BM) and Master of Applied Management (MAM) program offered by the University of Kerala. This comprehensive program is meticulously designed to achieve multifaceted objectives, including preparing students for

entry-level managerial positions in diverse organizational settings or empowering them to embark on entrepreneurial ventures. Emphasizing environmental sustainability, ethical considerations, and social acceptability, the course aims to groom well-rounded professionals capable of addressing contemporary challenges.

The program's structure spans a duration of five years, encompassing ten semesters, each comprising 16 instructional weeks. This extended duration allows for an in-depth exploration of managerial concepts and practical applications. The eligibility criteria for admission include a minimum of 45% marks in the 12th standard examination (with a relaxation to 40% for SC/ST students) and successful completion of a Common Admission Test. The uniqueness of this course lies in its integrated approach, allowing students to seamlessly transition from the Bachelor of Management (BM) to the Master of Applied Management (MAM) without the need for re-admission, provided there is no discontinuation of studies after the third year.

Furthermore, the framework of the program offers an additional entry point, allowing students who have acquired the Bachelor of Management (BM) degree to join later for the fourth and fifth years to complete the Master of Applied Management (MAM). This flexibility not only accommodates varying academic trajectories but also underscores the commitment to facilitating continuous learning opportunities.

In summary, the proposed incorporation of the BBA program in association with the Commerce Department and the exploration of the Dual Degree Course in Management present strategic pathways for departmental growth, aligning with the evolving educational landscape and catering to the diverse needs of aspiring students.
